1. Prompt		Chris Atchison Update on Prompt Payment Legislation:		
	Payment	• The government got to a certain place with BCCA in 2021 and has since pushed back this legislation.		
		We continue to tell them this is the single most important advocacy issue BCCA has.		
		• Government is starting to listen now due to the status of Prompt Payment Legislation in other jurisdictions. However, the movement isn't coming fast enough for the sector.		



- The office of the Attorney General reached out to BCCA and said they want to reconvene a broad reaching table that can start to examine what's going on in other jurisdictions and bring forward the specific needs of BC to move towards prompt payment legislation.
- BCCA and the regions going into this table will advocate for a system like Ontario where
  there are no public sector or crown court exemptions or exemptions is segments of
  industry that could undermined a suitable prompt payment and adjudication system in
  BC.
- BCCA is still waiting to hear details about this table. BCCA will be a part of this table and has reached out to their counterparts in Ontario who are subject matter experts.
- The system is working in Ontario.
- BCCA is looking for fairness and certainty in BC. With the intention that people are going to be dealt with fairly in contracts and have certainty around payment throughout the continuum of our system.

#### Question to Chris:

• What changes have you seen coming out of Ontario since prompt payment legislation?

#### Chris' Response:

- There has been a significant change in the mentality, however, there have been some abuses heard as well where old habits remain. Eventually those entities that have the idea that you can't contract out of legislation are catching up with old habits and from that standpoint there has been a fundamental culture change.
- We are seeing a greater incidence of adjudication through ODACC Ontario Dispute
  Adjudication for Construction Contracts where early on they where hardly seeing
  anyone and that was problematic for us. With the volume of adjudications coming
  in now ODACC can be sustainable.

### **Prompt Payment Status in Canada:**

- British Columbia No prompt payment legislation has been introduced.
- Alberta Prompt Payment and Adjudication in force since August 29, 2022.
- Manitoba 3rd reading of Bill 38 (Prompt Payment) on May 15, 2023.
- Saskatchewan Prompt Payment and Adjudication in force since March 1, 2022.
