	 Responses from recruiters: Employers aren't reacting as much as expected. Construction professionals are meeting immigration requirements but getting little reaction from employers. Employers need to participate more in the products the immigration system is delivering.

	President: Why do you think it's happening this way?
	Responses: Hiring managers are predominately Caucasian males in their 40s - 50s; perhaps still a preference for hiring people that look like them. Waiting for the perfect candidate, with local experience. We are overvaluing the local experience and forgetting that Canada is falling behind when it comes to IPD and Alliance experience. We are looking to New Zealand for innovation. Canada is a slow adopter of change and innovation.
	 The consequences are not yet forcing us to deal with underlying issues and change behaviour. There is a lack of companies interested in foreign workers at a Professional level and in the Trades. There is a stigma on foreign workers from bottom to top. It seems the larger contractors are the only ones looking at these people and their capabilities within 3-6 months. They are very trainable. Reluctance to take on anyone that doesn't have at least 2-3 years' experience in Canada. Companies are poaching primarily PM's & Site Superintendents. More broadly implemented employee retention programs could help. VRCA could give more praise to the companies doing it well. Unsure how companies can survive just hiring local workers alone. We need to better retain women. We lost 21% of women in trades last year.
2. Builders Lean Act & Prompt Payment Legislation	 We need to better retain women. We lost 21% of women in trades last year. VRCA & BCCA are maintaining pressure for legislation. Small claims court limits. Supreme court civil rules there are fast-track proceedings which are a more streamlined process in supreme court for claims expected to be under \$100,000.
